A Friendly Reminder About Our Pet Guidelines

We are so fortunate to live in a community where so many of us share our homes and our lives with beloved pets. Wagging tails, morning walks, and friendly greetings at the mailbox are a wonderful part of what makes the Cays such a warm and welcoming place to call home. With that in mind, we would like to gently revisit the pet guidelines that apply to our neighborhood. These guidelines mirror the City of Coronado municipal code, which means they carry the weight of local law. Following them helps keep our community safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone, including our four-legged friends.

Keeping Pets on Leash

Throughout Coronado, pets (including cats) are required to be kept on leash at all times, with two wonderful exceptions: Dog Beach and the designated dog run area of South Cays Park. Those are great spots to let your pup run free and burn off some energy! Everywhere else, please make sure your pet is leashed and under your control.

For those who enjoy visiting Coronado parks and beaches with their dogs, it is helpful to know which areas welcome leashed dogs. Under city rules, leashed dogs are permitted in the following parks:

- Centennial Park
- Paved areas of Tidelands Park
- Vetter Park
- Harborview Park
- Bayview Park

Dogs are not permitted, even on leash, in other parks or on beaches (other than Dog Beach) within the City.

Keeping the Peace

We all understand that animals make noise from time to time, and that is perfectly natural. However, city rules ask that no pet be kept or harbored in a manner that unreasonably disturbs the peace or quiet of neighbors. If your pet tends to bark persistently or causes other ongoing disturbances, it may be worth exploring some gentle training techniques or enrichment activities. Your neighbors will appreciate it, and so will your pet!

Cleaning Up After Our Pets

This one is simple but important. Anyone walking a pet is required by city law to immediately pick up and properly dispose of any waste left by their animal. Waste must be placed in a closable container and deposited in a public trash receptacle, or in a private trash bin with the owner's permission (not the green yard / food waste bins please). This rule applies to all public property as well as private property, unless the property owner has specifically given permission.

Please always carry waste bags on your walks. They are a small item that make a big difference in keeping our sidewalks, parks, and common areas clean and pleasant for everyone.

Thank You for Being a Great Neighbor

The vast majority of our pet-owning residents are already doing a wonderful job, and we appreciate it! These reminders are simply meant to help ensure that everyone, residents, guests, and pets alike, can continue to enjoy all that our beautiful community has to offer.
